President's Message

Hello!

The 49th annual Southern California Botanists symposium occurred on October 21st, 2023 at Pomona College in Claremont, CA. Our topic was *I'll Take My Plants Rare!* We had a total of 180 attendees. This was our best turnout since before the pandemic, and one of our best turn outs overall – we are so excited to have spent such an incredible day with so many of you!

We raised \$1,213.00 during our silent auction. All of this money will go towards the Gary Wallace Conservation Grant. This is one of our annual grants that we offer to support research or projects that contribute to the understanding and conservation of rare plants in southern California. In total, we raised \$7,995.13 in revenue above expenses. This revenue is vital to the functioning of SCB, as it helps fund student grants and scholarships for symposium attendance, as well as SCB's annual program of work, which includes publishing Leaflets and Crossosoma, conducting workshops and field trips, and organizing future symposia. The great turnout at this year's symposium helps us make these programs possible, and we are so grateful that you all were able to join us!

During the lunch break, we had a successful career panel that was well attended by early career folks. Many great questions were asked, and it was a perfect time for networking and open communication about different careers in botany. Following the symposium, SCB hosted a poster session at Pomona College, while the mixer and banquet were held at the Memorial Park in Claremont. Food was catered during the mixer by Just Vegana, a truly delicious all-vegan catering company.

We would like to thank Pomona College for generously allowing use of their auditorium and building space. For many years now (excluding virtual covid years!), the Southern California Botanists

Oak Workshop Report

Our own SCB Board Member and co-Editor of *Crossosoma*, Fred Roberts, put on another successful oak workshop at the San Diego Botanic Gardens in Encinitas. The "Oaks of Southern California Workshop" consisted of two days of in-depth discussion on the genus *Quercus* in Southern California. On the first day Fred taught the 15 attendees the details of each *Quercus* species by providing detailed information in a handout, a Keynote presentation, and fresh specimens. To end the first day, everyone was fortunate enough to look at the trichomes of each oak leaf under a high-powered, high-resolution microscope provided by the botanic garden, and projected on the large flat screen. The second day of the workshop sent attendees on a trek from Encinitas east to Julian and the desert near Banning. The group got to inspect and discuss 18 *Quercus* taxa and several hybrids in Southern California during the class.



Upcoming Workshop: The Cacti of California

Dates: March 9-10, 2024

Where: Steele-Burnand Anza Borrego Desert Research Center, 401 Tilting T. Drive, Borrego Springs, CA 92004

Cacti are a diverse and integral component of our Southern California ecosystems, comprising approximately 38 species in 12 genera. Cacti exhibit several unique adaptations which allow them to survive our hot, dry environments. This two-day workshop will include a classroom day covering the evolution, biogeography, adaptations, and taxonomy of the cactus family, along with more detailed information on all of the cactus species found in California. The field day will provide a close look at the many cactus species of the Anza-Borrego Desert State Park region. There will also be live specimens for study of several species found outside the Anza-Borrego region.
